# Introducing RECONNECT (II)

The ideal design? Article 2 TEU

The Union is founded on the values of respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and respect for human rights, including the rights of persons belonging to minorities. These values are common to the Member States in a society in which pluralism, non-discrimination, tolerance, justice, solidarity and equality between women and men prevail.

- EU in state of turmoil: financial-economic crisis, Eurozone sovereign debt crisis, migration, security, rule of law, Brexit, ...
- Erosion of EU authority and legitimacy: perception that the EU is not fair / just, that Europe shows too little solidarity, ...

# Introducing RECONNECT (III)

- How can European governance become more firmly rooted in justice and solidarity?
- How can European governance regain authority and legitimacy?
- How can it renew trust and recognition with its citizens?

→ How can we 'reconnect' European governance with EU citizens?

# Introducing RECONNECT (IV)

- A comprehensive and integrated examination of principles, practices, and perceptions of democracy and the rule of law in the EU and its Member States
  - → Under which conditions can democracy and the rule of law lead to (more) authority and legitimacy of the EU?
- Four key case studies:
  - Economic and fiscal governance, counter-terrorism, trade and migration

# Authority and legitimacy: some clarifications (I)

- *Authority* = delegated competence to exercise power
- Legitimacy = morally justified exercise of power
- However, both EU's authority and legitimacy = contested and existentially challenged due to its unique nature and multi-level system of governance
- Complex relationship sovereignty authority legitimacy
  - Sovereignty concerns remain very much alive (e.g. calls for repatriation of powers to national level)
  - To what extent can democracy and rule of law exist in complex multilevel systems of governance with large degree of shared sovereignty?



# Authority and legitimacy: some clarifications (II)

- What is impact of the EU's many crises and challenges on the EU's authority and legitimacy?
- The 'puzzle of authority': who does, can and should legitimately exercise authority?
- Increasing complexity: embedded and shifting loci of authority in different policy areas and under different competences/EU Treaty provisions
- Contested legitimacy calls the EU's own authority into question



## RECONNECT Case-Studies (I)

#### **Economic and Fiscal Governance (WP10)**

- Far-reaching EU-level executive measures in response to the financial and Euro area crises
- New intergovernmental arrangements and treaties
  - Potential lack of democratic oversight and rule of law constraints
  - Limited role for European Parliament, national parliaments and CJEU
- What are the implications of such arrangements?
- What are the consequences for solidarity and justice?



#### RECONNECT Case-Studies (II)

#### **Counter-Terrorism Policies (WP11)**

- Shared competence
- Balancing act between enhancing security and protecting democracy, rule of law, fundamental rights
- Analysis of EU institutions and implications of horizontal cooperation within the EU for democratic accountability and rule of law
  - E.g. CJEU and JHA intelligence and policing agencies

## RECONNECT Case-Studies (III)

#### **Trade Policy (WP 12)**

- Exclusive EU competence
- Analysis of a potential trade-off between the quest for effectiveness and a greater democratic legitimacy in EU FTAs
- Analysis of politicisation in EU trade policy including citizens' and civil society's contestation of trade issues
- Analysis of judicial review and dispute settlement mechanisms in trade policy: legitimizing effect on EU's authority in the field?



## RECONNECT Case-Studies (IV)

#### Migration Policy (WP13)

- Shared competence
- Resurgence of nationalist discourses potentially undermining solidarity and belief in EU legitimacy in the area of migration
- Analysis of trade-offs between EU and national coordination, democratic legitimacy and rule of law mechanisms
- How can the EU's legitimacy and credibility regain strength?

## Questions to be addressed in this workshop

- How to make sense of the complexity of current authority arrangements between the EU and its MS?
  - Vertical horizontal dimensions
- What caused the current erosion of legitimacy of EU institutions?
- How can citizens be placed at the centre of a new legitimacy narrative?



## Expected workshop outcomes

- Clarifying and reflecting on notions of legitimacy, authority and sovereignty
  - The conditions under which democracy and rule of law as understood in the EU context can lead to legitimacy and authority for the Union
- What should EU institutions deliver and be held accountable for?
- How to pave the way towards 'reconnecting' EU institutions with citizens?
